New grader to tackle road program

A new motor grader has joined Horsham Rural City Council's road plant fleet.

six-wheel-drive John Deere 672GP will be responsible for the important task of road re-construction maintenance across municipality.

The timing of its delivery is particularly valuable as HRCC gets to work repairing flood damaged roads.

"The new grader is a big step up in technology compared to the older machines. This allows it to provide much improved fuel economy, driver comfort and ease of operation," Acting Fleet Coordinator Tim McDonald said.

"Graders have traditionally been one of the more difficult pieces of equipment to master manufacturers have incorporated GPS guidance technology to make operation easier and increase production and efficiency," he said.

With a road network that spans more than 3,000 kms, Council's graders can always be found working on road maintenance, improvement and rehabilitation.

STOP MOSQUITOES FROM BREEDING IN YOUR BACKYARD

Residents are being urged to do their part to limit the breeding of mosquitoes in their backyards, as Horsham Rural City Council steps up its control program ahead of summer.

Council's Environmental Health team uses an integrated mosquito management approach, including larval and adult insecticides to control mosquito numbers.

But its co-ordinator Luke Mitton said it was up to locals to do their part in their own backyard.

"Reducing breeding grounds for mosquitoes is one of the most effective ways to limit mosquito numbers in the Horsham area. You can do your part by regularly emptying out stagnant water from containers, pet bowls, old tyres, bird baths and flowerpots," Mr Mitton said.

"While there are no outbreaks at the moment, mosquitoes in Horsham have the potential to carry and transmit diseases like Ross River Fever, Barmah Forest Virus, Dengue Fever and Japanese Encephalitis, all of which have serious health implications.

"Using personal protections like using insect repellent, wearing longsleeved loose-fitting clothing, avoiding the outdoors at dawn and dusk, and using mosquito coils around the house can reduce your chance of being bitten and avoid a potential mosquito-borne disease."

Don't forget the children - and consider spraying or rubbing insect repellents on their clothes rather than directly onto their skin.
