A three-day Engagement Expo at the Horsham Town Hall last week has been an outstanding success, with more than 150 participants visiting the Town Hall on Thursday, Friday and Saturday to provide feedback on a range of projects and initiatives.

Community members were engaged in meaningful conversations, with the majority spending at least 30 minutes talking with staff and councillors.

All Councillors attended at some point across the three days.

Friday and Saturday morning were the busiest times.

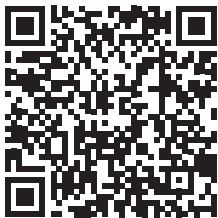
“It was great to see so many people take the time to look around all the projects on display, to ask questions and provide feedback,” HRCC Chief Executive Officer Sunil Bhalla said.

“Parking meters, roads and our municipality’s advocacy priorities generated the most discussion.

“Council staff will collate all Expo feedback and provide it to Councillors in an Engagement Report, which will be made available to the community and considered by Council when developing the Budget for 2024-2025,” he said.

Projects on way for Natimuk Advisory Committee members needed

Natimuk residents are being encouraged to put their hand up to guide the roll out of town projects across the next 12 months.

New street furniture, a bespoke bus shelter and an electric vehicle charger will be delivered as part of Horsham Rural City Council’s 2023-2024 Budget.

But first, a Community Advisory Committee needs to be finalised, with three positions remaining vacant.

The three projects have come from the Natimuk Economic & Social Plan which the community developed during 2022.

Chief Executive Officer Sunil Bhalla said more ideas were sought.

“Additional projects will be funded as part of our three-year plan which needs the community, Council and other stakeholders to work in the same direction,” he said.

“The Natimuk community is the owner of the Economic and Social Plan. As a Council, we are committed to supporting the implementation of projects within it,” Mr Bhalla said.

Remaining vacancies on the Advisory Committee will be filled at community meeting on Wednesday 23 August.

- A member with an interest in sustainability and the environment
- A younger person (16-25 years)
- An older person (60+ years)

E-waste can't be put into any of your bins.

Old electronics don't belong in your household bins. You can recycle these items instead. There are e-waste recycling points at the Horsham, Quantong, Mt Zero and Toolondo transfer stations. Once collected, the items are processed in Horsham at Axis Worx. By keeping e-waste out of your bins, it can be recycled into new things. Metals such as tin, copper or nickel can be reused to make new electronics. While each object has only a very small amount of each precious metal, this can quickly add up when you consider how many devices are disposed of each year. Once they're gone, they're gone for good. But if e-waste is properly recycled, these materials can be reused endlessly.
