The purpose of the plan

The Mitre Community Plan was developed by Horsham Rural City Council at the instigation of the Mitre community. The Plan identifies and prioritises a range of initiatives that the community believes would benefit their town.

Community planning workshop

A community planning workshop was held at the Mitre Public Hall on August 30, 2017. This workshop was attended by 30 community members ranging in age from teenagers to seniors. During this event community members identified Mitre's assets and made suggestions about projects, activities and events that they would like to see in Mitre.

About Mitre

The Mitre township is located on the junction of Natimuk-Frances Road, Mitre-Nurcoung Road and Tooan-Mitre Road. It is 20 kilometres west of Natimuk, 23 kilometres east of Goroke and 45 kilometres from Horsham.



Mitre gets its name from nearby Mitre Rock which is part of the Mount Arapiles-Tooan State Park and is a popular spot for hikers and rock climbers.

There are eight occupied houses in the Mitre township and 12 people. The 'Mitre district', however, comprises approximately 37 houses and 69 people (2016 Census data). The township is fringed in all directions by farmland and agriculture is the predominant industry. The region produces cereal, pulse and oilseed crops, beef, lamb and wool and poultry products.

Mitre has a rich history, being close to the site of the famed Jane Duff 'Lost in the Bush' story. The true story of the survival of Jane Duff and her two brothers who were lost in bushland close to Mitre for nine days was included in the Victorian school curriculum from 1930 to the 1960s.

While Mitre once boasted a school, church, tennis club and post office, today the town's main physical asset, as identified by community residents, is the Mitre Public Hall.



Vision for Mitre

The community planning workshop was seen not only as an opportunity to consider what residents would like for Mitre, but also as an occasion to gather.

From the discussion it was evident that maintaining and building on Mitre's identity and the connectedness residents felt to their community and one another was the predominant shared vision that attendees had for Mitre.

The following priorities were identified, and voted on, by residents at the community planning workshop. They appear in order of preference.
