Corridor solution

Horsham Rural City Council has released a plan to transform the city's rail corridor into several hectares of public open space for comment.

The landscape concept plan is the next step in the community's long-running bid to transform the industrial rail corridor from an eyesore to an asset.

"Council will hold public feedback sessions on November 22 and 23 to ensure the design captures all of the community's suggestions and concerns.

Design details are largely based on the extensive community feedback provided as part of the Horsham North Local Area Plan, released in May this year, together with known site limitations.

"The appearance of the rail corridor was consistently the number one issue raised by the community. People told us they want this area to look nicer, feel safer and better connect north and south Horsham," Chief Executive Officer Sunil Bhalla said.

"This landscape design includes a series of connecting paths for walkers and cyclists which provide an alternative route to busy roads such as Mill Street. There are also smaller trails winding through the corridor to explore woodlands planted within the area.

"There will also be a carpark for 39 cars near the Silo Art installation with seats and viewing areas and opportunities across the corridor for public art and storytelling.

"Importantly, the plan includes landscaping to support a new proposed rail underpass linking to the northern end of David Street, which, if funded, would provide a safer pedestrian route from the north to the south of the city and will also be compatible for any return of passenger rail in the future," he said.

The Landscape Plan feedback sessions will be held at Kalkee Road Children's Hub on

November 22 and 23 from 11am-1.30pm and 5pm to 7.30pm both days.

People can also view the plan at the Civic Centre and complete an online survey via the QR code.

To take advantage of the free period, people must enter their vehicle registration in a meter or via the Blinkay mobile app.

Also, free parking has been made available for accessible parking permit holders. There is no need for blue or green card holders to enter the number plate into the meter or Blinkay App but time limits still apply.

Have you downloaded the Blinkay app?

When paying for parking via the app, you do not need to go to the meter at all. It's cheaper, quicker and you can also claim your free 30 minutes from your phone. Scan the QR code to install.



BOOK OF THE WEEK


Title: Remarkably Bight Creatures Author: Shelby Van Pelt

Well, if you're lucky, you can clear-up a lifelong family mystery. When Tova's husband passed away, she switched from caring for him to cleaning at the Sowell Bay Aquarium, as keeping busy has always helped her cope with grief since their son disappeared 30 years ago.

30 years ago. Marcellus has been confounding his captors and counting the days since his incarceration began, watching the passing people with a remarkably observant eye for a cephalopod. As he watches Tova, he reaches out – literally, tentacularly – to her, and soon an understanding between them develops.

Why we recommend it: This book does a fantastic job of exploring what it means to feel grief and covers friendship and redemption in an exciting new way. This

book does contain information regarding a death by suicide so take care of yourself while reading. The story is an easy read by a debut author that explores both the stories of a sentient creature on display at a public aquarium as well as those of the Bay's human residents, providing eye-opening new perspectives on life.
